2010 Joe Hill Award Recipient: Jerry Gray of the renowned Canadian group The Travellers

The Joe Hill Award honors leaders and artists who have contributed to the successful integration of arts and culture in the labor movement. Given every year at the Great Labor Arts Exchange, it is awarded to persons based on their dedication, participation, and promotion of labor, labor arts, culture, organizing, and/or history.

Jerry Gray founder of The Travellers- Folk group formed in Toronto during the summer of 1953 by Jerry Gray, banjo and lead singer. Under Jerry's leadership the group would survive for decades through the changes of the movement, politics, and the evolution of the folk music tradition. The Travellers performed for many audiences including children and university campuses. Much of their music resonated with the years of campus unrest, and its recording of labor songs, A Century of Song (1967), established the Travellers' profile in the Canadian Labour Movement. Reducing their itinerary in the late 1970s they continued to appear in schools, and for political events and labour rallies through the 1980s, by then averaging some 30 performances a year. Jerry recently performed during the tribute for Pete Seeger's 90th birthday.

What began as a labor arts exchange has grown into a strong and vibrant national community organization where artists, activists, and organizers could share music, art, and performance works that speak to their experiences, vision, and work for and in the labor movement.

The Great Labor Arts Exchange is a gathering of union and community activists, rank and file union members, organizers,

cultural workers, artists, labor educators, and youth who use, or support the use of, songs, art, poetry, theater, skits, posters, cartoons, and film to strengthen the labor movement. You don't need to be an artist or performer to attend or perform! Nourish your soul in an atmosphere of creativity and solidarity; Celebrate the rich cultural heritage of working people; Network with labor musicians, organizers, performers, visual artists, and writers.
